**Headline Performance:** Border CrosSing Ahmed Fernando Anzaldúa El Samkary, Artistic Director Friday, January 13, 8:00 p.m., Lawrence University Memorial Chapel



**Border CrosSing** is an award-winning Minnesota-based arts non-profit. Our mission-driven work includes our historic 2019 performance of Osvaldo Golijov's "la Pasión según San Marcos" with the Minnesota Orchestra, named as one of the year's best concerts by the Star Tribune; our sheet music editions and publications on Graphite; and the publication of ouro first studio album with Bridge Records in April 2022 that celebrates BIPOC composers across the Americas. Our programming gained international attention when we became recipients of the 2020 ASCAP Award for Adventurous Programming, awarded by Chorus America.

Ahmed Fernando Anzaldúa El Samkary is a Mexican conductor and pianist of Egyptian descent. Early in his career, he was awarded the first prize at the Maria Clara Cullel International Piano Competition. He's since then avoided participating in competitions in favor of championing the works of new composers and exploring his musical heritage. Ahmed is a recognized authority in Latin American and Spanish music, particularly the compositions of Federico Mompou and Miguel Bernal Jiménez. He regularly collaborates with composers to premiere new works, including Helmut Lachenmann, Paul Lansky, and Arturo Marquez. His most recent recordings include Carteles, recorded for FMM, and Contemplating Weather, on Bridge Records. Ahmed holds Master's degrees in Piano Performance and Choral Conducting from Western Michigan University, where he taught before moving to Minnesota, and carried out postgraduate work at the Queen Sofia College of Music in Madrid, Spain. He received a doctorate in Music Conducting at the University of Minnesota, under the mentorship of Kathy Romey. Apart from his work with Border CrosSing, he is co-editor of the Justice Choir Songbook and is Director of Music Ministries at Unity Church – Unitarian in St. Paul, Minnesota.



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### **Interest Sessions**

Inviting Young Singers: Creating Skills, Musicianship and Community in Group Singing

Friday, January 13, 9:10-9:55 a.m., Paper Valley Empire Room

Beginning with the first music class, elementary vocal music teachers lay the foundation for group singing at all levels. In a safe environment, choir participation extends and refines skills and nourishes the love of choral singing. Resources and suggestions for choir teacher-conductors and their students will be shared in this session.



Cheryl Meyer was a vocal-general music specialist in Illinois and Wisconsin before retiring from the Appleton Area School District, where she served as a cooperating teacher for pre-service educators, and as a mentor to initial educators. As a teacher-conductor with the Lawrence Community Girl Choir Program, she led various choirs with singers from third through eighth grade. Cheryl has also conducted vocal and handbell choirs at several Fox Valley churches. A recipient of the WCDA Morris D. Hayes award, she has served WCDA as a Singing in Wisconsin Youth Choir conductor, Children's Repertoire and Resources Chair, co-chair of the state convention Youth Choir, and presented sessions and choirs at state conventions and other WCDA events.

### Singing Through Change: Female Voice in Midlife

Joanne Bozeman, Presenter Friday, January 13, 11:30 a.m. -12:15 p.m., Paper Valley Empire Room

Of the many millions of people who sing with community and church choirs, well over half are women. Most of these women, in midlife, will encounter the menopause transition, a multi-year process that in a number of singers causes voice changes. This session will help choral directors understand the psycho-social context of midlife, the shifting hormonal landscape of the menopause transition, and its potential effects on the singing voice. Choral singing offers women the opportunity to maintain vocal comfort and fitness through and beyond midlife, when choral conductors support them in adapting to changing voice conditions.



A graduate of the University of Arizona, **Joanne Bozeman** has been a singing teacher for 48 years. For 26 of these years, she was a faculty member at Lawrence University's Conservatory of Music, where she taught singing and a number of voice and music education courses. In addition to her career as a voice teacher, Joanne was an actively performing soprano as well as a coach with the Lawrence Community Music School Girl Choir. Inspired by her long-standing interest in voice health and the relationship of hormones with voice throughout the female lifespan, Joanne co-authored the book, Singing Through Change: Women's Voices in Midlife, Menopause, and Beyond, released in 2020.

She is a frequent presenter on the subject of female voice and hormones for many organizations including the National Association of Teachers of Singing (NATS), the International Congress of Voice Teachers, the British Voice Association, and the Pan American Vocology Association. Retired from academia and professional singing, Joanne continues to be engaged with the voice community as a teacher and

researcher.



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### **Interest Sessions**

#### Into the Muddle: Opening the High School Choir Room

Luke Hrovat-Staedter, Madison East High School Friday, January 13, 3:40-4:30 p.m., St. Mary's Community Room

This session is for choral educators interested in alternative options to the traditional concert cycle-style of large ensemble classrooms. This presentation details a high school choir program's excursion into participatory action research, activism, and student voice in the secondary choir classroom. We will talk through the implementation of musical project-based action research, the lessons learned, and the implications for the choral space moving forward.



Luke Hrovat-Staedter has spent 9 years teaching secondary music in Madison, WI where he currently teaches choir, hip hop studies, and piano at Madison East High School. Additionally, he has experience as a vocalist and keyboardist in a variety of different musical worlds. Luke received both of his degrees from UW-Madison (BM & MM in Music Education) where he developed special interest in the expanding possibilities both within and in-addition-to the traditional Big 3 school music ensembles, specifically around the pedagogical lenses of Hip Hop Pedagogy and Youth Participatory Action Research.

### Performance Practice: A Linguistic Approach to Dialect for African American Spirituals

Dr. Felicia Barber, Yale University Saturday, January 14, 8:35-9:30 a.m., Lawrence University Harper Hall

The interpretation of a piece of music is dependent on a number of factors, which may include its melody, harmony, and rhythm. However, in the area of choral music, it is the text that serves as a defining characteristic. The pronunciation and interpretation of a text is key to understanding its meaning, as well as cultural interpretation. One of the most persistent problems found in the performance practice of African American Spirituals is its dialect. This presentation will review the history of the languages and dialects that developed out of the African Diaspora; discover how to apply the chief phonological features found; and instruct teachers on how to employ these findings, using the International Phonetic Alphabet, to enhance the performance practice of spirituals.



At the Yale School of Music and Yale Institute of Sacred Music, **Felicia Barber** serves as Associate Professor, Adjunct, of Choral Conducting and conducts the Yale Camerata. In addition to teaching graduate-level choral conductors and aspiring undergraduate conductors, Barber is developing a new initiative designed to prepare Yale students to work with young musicians on choral music in school and church settings.

Dr. Barber's research interests include effective teaching strategies, fostering classroom diversity and incorporating equity and justice initiatives in choral curricula, and the linguistic performance practice of

African American spirituals, has contributed to such periodicals as the American Choral Directors Association's Choral Journal and is the author of A New Perspective for the Use of Dialect in African American Spirituals: History, Context, and Linguistics (Rowman & Littlefield, 2021). She has given clinics and presentations on topics related to diversity in choral music and implicit bias in classical music, among other areas, at institutions across the United States, and in 2021 delivered a lecture at Yale titled "Performance Practice: A Linguistic Approach to Dialect Found in Spirituals."

Dr. Barber holds a B.M. in Vocal Performance from Oral Roberts University, an M.M. in Music Education from Mansfield University, and a Ph.D. in Choral Music Education and Choral Conducting from The Florida State University.


